



- **1.** We use 'a' when the next word starts with a consonant, for example 'a nuisance'.
- 2. You should have considered events in the book and how each character has shown their power (or lack of power).
- **3.** Test yourself by writing them out without looking!
- 4. Answers may include: 'frightening', 'chilling', 'petrifying' and so on.
- 5. It is a command (an order or instruction).
- 6. These show ownership, so in this sentence it is 'her'.
- 7. You should have thought about what you know about the character, how they behave, what others think of them etc.
- 8. 'Recognise'. A verb is used for an action, state or occurrence.
- **9.** Examples should include headline, paragraphs, subheadings and so on.
- **10.** Your drawing should be as accurate as possible using details from the text.
- **11.** Ask your family member what they thought of your poetry recital what did you do well and do they have any tips for next time?
- 12/13. Hopefully you have thought about what to tell the reader to make them want to read the book.
 - 14. I'm friends with a boy <u>who plays the drums</u>. A relative classe is a string of words that is linked to the noun before it (the boy in this case).
 - **15.** Your definition should be along these lines: A text which is factual and provides information to a reader.







- **16.** Test yourself by writing them out without looking!
- **17.** Examples could include the type of transport (e.g. horse and carriage, car or hoverboard) or what technology is used by the characters.
- **18.** An adjective (describing word) should be added before 'lake', for example 'tranquil' or 'silent'.
- **19.** Answers will vary but may include locations such as a log cabin, an abandoned mansion or a remote hotel.
- **20.** Examples may include because, therefore and consequently.
- **21.** We can include description of their appearance or behaviour, such as quivering, having wide eyes, and their voice being shaky.
- 22. Neighbour is the subject and vehicle is the object.
- **23.** Answers will vary. Hopefully you have a few memories that would make your readers laugh!
- 24. Hopefully you have had a think about how the word creates an image or idea for the reader.
- **25.** Test yourself by writing them out without looking!
- **26.** A fronted adverbial is when the adverbial word or phrase is moved to the start of a sentence. Example: Many years ago, I had a penpal.
- **27.** Hopefully you have managed to think of a song that matches your current mood or physical state, such as happy or relaxed.
- **28.** Examples should contain a co-ordinating conjunction such as 'and', 'but' or 'or'.







- **29/30.** Responses will vary but should include various locations from the story, such as characters' homes, school/workplace and local landmarks.
 - **31.** First person: I, me, my. Pronouns can replace nouns in a sentence.
