



- 1. Check them carefully or ask a grown-up to check with you!
- 2. Remember to end your sentence with an exclamation mark.
- **3.** Adjectives are describing words. For example: The **big brown shaggy** dog found a **thin wet** stick.
- 4. There are two mistakes in this sentence. First the word 'hair' is the incorrect spelling, it should actually be 'hare'. Second, the name 'harold' is a proper noun and should start with a capital letter. The correct answer is: A tortoise raced with a hare called Harold.
- 5. A verb is a doing word. Your sentence should use the word 'write' as a verb. For example: Write the date in the top left hand corner of your page.
- **6/7.** Your poem needs to be about love. Read it loudly and confidently. Try to remember the poem line by line to help you recite it from memory.
 - 8. Remember to end your sentence with a question mark. For example: Is dad outside washing the car?
 - **9.** Make a prediction based on what you already know about the plot and the characters in your book.
 - **10.** Write a paragraph based on the prediction you made yesterday. Remember to use capital letters and punctuation appropriately.
 - 11. You should have used apostrophes to contract these words. The answers are: I'm, don't and can't.
 - 12. Check them carefully or ask a grown-up to check with you!
- 13/14. You can be as creative as you want when you write this poem! Your poem could be any form it could rhyme, be acrostic or a shape poem. You can think about people you love in your life and use that as inspiration.







- **15.** You could create a drawing, painting or create a piece of artwork with tissue paper. Re-read your poem to get inspiration for your artwork.
- 16. Speech marks should be added to this sentence to indicate direct speech. The answer is: "Hello" shouted Celine. "Can you hear me from over there?" Steph shouted back.
- 17. The sentence should be changed so it is in the past tense. The verb 'visit' should be changed to 'visited' by adding the suffix -ed, to indicate the tense has changed. The answer is: I visited my grandparents, who live in London.
- **18.** Adjectives are describing words. Examples of adjectives that describe the colour green are: **leafy**, **lush**, **growth**, **harmony**, **fresh**.
- Common nouns refer to general, non-specific people, places, things or ideas. The common nouns which should be underlined are: mountains and trees.
- **20.** Remember to split up items in your list with commas. For example: My favourite fruits and vegetables are peaches, mangoes, strawberries, cucumber, avocado and kale.
- 21. A synonym is a word that means the same thing as another word. Examples of synonyms for the word big include: **enormous, gigantic, massive, giant, colossal.**
- 22. A verb is a doing word and an adverb adds detail to a verb. For example: "I need a drink of water!" Jack **shouted aggressively**. The word 'shouted' is the verb and the word 'aggressively' is the adverb.
- **23.** The answer is: The **book's** pages.
- **24.** Check them carefully or ask a grown-up to check with you!
- **25.** A proper noun refers to a specific person, place or thing. The words that should be circled are: **London, Amy** and **Paris**.







- **26/27.** This recommendation should include: the title of the book, author's name, why you liked the book, why you disliked the book, what you would change or improve about the book and a summary of the storyline.
 - **28.** You can include your favourite characters on the cover, or an interesting setting from the story. You can be as creative as you would like!
 - **29.** Remember to include commas to split up the words in your list. Adjectives are describing words.
